



A Commitment to the child

What we do

Special Operations Warrior Foundation is dedicated to empowering the families of fallen special operations warriors by ensuring a fully funded education to every child of a fallen special operations service member. From cradle to career, Special Operations Warrior Foundation funds all educational expenses including early childhood education, tutoring, educational counseling, test preparation, a college preparation course and full-tuition expenses to any college technical or vocational school, public or private.

Special Operations Warrior Foundation also provides immediate financial assistance to wounded and injured special operations personnel who are hospitalized and separated from their families.

What does fully fund mean?

SOWF funds early childhood education and preschool programs, professional tutoring at any age, college prep including a preparatory workshop called Operation EPIC (Education Preparation Information Conference), ACT/SAT prep, college applications, college visits, full tuition, books, fees, room and board, travel, and miscellaneous expenses.





Programs

Preschool- SOWF provides funding for accredited early childhood education programs (from ages 3-5) including preschool and prekindergarten programs.

Private Tutoring- Fully funded professional, private tutoring for students from kindergarten through college graduation anywhere in the country. Whether the child is having trouble learning to read, or struggling in acing their AP exams to get into their dream college, private, one on one tutoring and educational services are provided at no cost to the student.

College Planning Conference - Operation EPIC Special Operations Warrior Foundation hosts a comprehensive, week-long college planning conference for our high school students in their sophomore and junior years. Held in Tampa, this conference is designed to help high school students understand the college admissions process, the steps necessary to get into the school of their choice, and to help determine the right school and program. It is also a unique opportunity to spend time with other students and graduates who can relate to the distinctive struggles that come with losing a parent.

College Application Fees- Special Operations Warrior Foundation reimburses application fees for three colleges

College Visits – Choosing the right college is critical to the success of our students. SOWF funds college campus visits for high school students and a guardian so they can be confident in their decision when choosing their college.

College Scholarships - SOWF covers the full cost of a college education including tuition, fees, room and board, books, tutoring, computer, printer, and supplies. Our scholarships are guaranteed, without an application, and can be used for private universities, state or community colleges, vocational/technical training, and career institutions.

Internship Program- SOWF connects our college students and recent graduates with internship opportunities to assist with building professional skills and confidence for job seeking. SOWF facilitates this by connecting corporate sponsors and supporting companies with students who are studying a relevant industry.

College to Career Mentoring- Our college students have access to career mentoring services, including interview strategies, resume building, social media presence, etc. When they graduate, our students are ready to enter into their careers confidently and seamlessly.

Wounded Support - Special Operations Warrior Foundation coordinated with U.S. Special Operations Command (USSOCOM) to ensure immediate financial assistance to wounded, ill, or injured special operations personnel who are hospitalized. Once notified by USSOCOM of a candidate for support, SOWF will immediately overnight mail a check to the service member (or designated recipient) to underwrite initial and unexpected expenses.





Facts and What Sets Us Apart

Fast Facts

Special Operations Forces make up less than 2% of the Department of Defense but suffer over 2/3 of the casualties

The average age of a child entering our program is 8 years old

89% of our high school graduates enter college

92% of our college freshman complete college in less than 6 years

The average cost for one child's education from preschool through full college education is \$100,000.

What about the VA/GI Bill/ Gov Benefits?

Our scholarship program is designed to fund the difference between the Forever GI Bill and the total cost of attending the school of the student's choice.

This includes paying the difference when tuition exceeds the max amount allowed by the Department of Affairs and ensuring full funding past the maximum of 36 months of education.

Funding is customized to each student and also covers tuition, room & board, books, supplies, computer, transportation and other expenses

History

Special Operations Warrior Foundation started in 1980 with a battlefield promise to provide college educations for the 17 children left behind by the eight men who lost their lives during Operation Eagle Claw, the daring attempt to rescue the 53 American hostages being held in Iran.

Today, Special Operations Warrior Foundation (SOWF) ensures full financial assistance for a post-secondary education, as well as tutoring and educational counseling, to all children of special operations service members who lose their lives in the line of duty. SOWF also provides immediate financial assistance to all severely wounded and hospitalized special operations service members.
