Message from the President & CEO



Please accept my heartfelt thanks for your continued support of our mission.

As we celebrated our 43rd
Anniversary on April 24, 2023, we reflected on the inception of our

Foundation and what has occurred since 1980. The original battlefield promise made is enduring and our commitment continues in earnest to the surviving students, surviving spouses and families we rally around. Through donor involvement, we are privileged to continue to add new educational programs and build momentum, all in the best interests of those we serve.

Regarding 2022, 85 children were added to our SOWF programs, 46 of whom are children of Medal of Honor Recipients. We added several new programs including, Private School Tuition Assistance, Home School Assistance, a High School Summer Enrichment Program - and SOWF now covers the cost of five college applications (up from three), while increasing our college visit stipend to \$5,000. In addition, we expanded eligibility for educational programs to include active-duty Special Operations Personnel who lose their spouse, done in recognition of the critical role spouses play in our Special Operations families.

Our Scholarships and Family Outreach Team (SFO) works deliberately with students and families every step of the way to ensure all are aware of, and utilize, the assorted programs and services SOWF provides. Under the guidance of SFO's team this past year, 43 students enrolled in post-secondary schools, with 88% of those

students attending four-year schools. In 2022, SOWF had 210 students in college, and funds raised in 2022 were applied to tuition, room and board, books, and miscellaneous college expenses. We are pleased to report that a total of 36 students graduated from college in 2022. And it is important to note that approximately 81% of our surviving children attend college, a university, or a trade school, well above the national average in this demographic.

In a relatively short period of time, we have gone from 800 children being eligible for college educations to over 1,000. Invariably, there will be more fatalities in the years to come and we need to be ready to respond.

With respect to our severely wounded, ill, and injured Special Operations Personnel program, which was added in 2006, over 1,200 have received beneficial stipends since it began. This effort, that provides immediate financial assistance to the individual and their respective families, saw 36 Special Operations Personnel participate in 2022, up 25 from the previous year.

SOWF was awarded our 16th consecutive 4-star rating from Charity Navigator, meaning we take our stewardship seriously – a sincere thanks for trusting us with your contributions and joining us in the process. This teamwork approach has amounted to much student success, quite a testament to all involved.

Programs

Educational Programs

Special Operations Warrior Foundation ensures full financial assistance for a post-secondary degree from an accredited college, university, technical, or trade school. The array of programs now includes Preschool Funding, Private Tutoring, Support for Students with Disabilities, Private K-12 School Tuition Assistance, College Planning, College Scholarships, and College-to-Career transition support. In 2022, SOWF provided funding for 210 students in colleges and universities across the country and 38 students received their college degree.

Family Outreach

Our educational and family support services go hand-in-hand with our scholarship program. Our dedicated staff proactively contacts every family of fallen Special Operations Personnel at the earliest appropriate time and then remains in steady communication through the years. In 2022, we reached out to the surviving families of 28 fallen Special Operations Forces Personnel. To help each student reach their full potential, SOWF offers individual academic advocacy, programs, and services to all eligible children beginning in preschool. SOWF's advocates are there to ensure that each student is on track to reach their goals. To help celebrate their special days, personalized birthday cards are sent to children and students of all ages. And, whenever the Scholarships and Family Outreach Team travel, our staff always make a point to connect with as many students as possible over lunch or dinner to spend quality time with each and their respective family.

Support for Wounded, III, and Injured

SOWF provides severely wounded, ill, or injured SOF warriors with a financial stipend, up to \$5,000, to relieve the burden of unexpected expenses when hospitalized. Additionally, SOWF sends an iPad to help the service member communicate with family and friends. SOWF provided stipends to 25 wounded, ill, or injured SOF warriors in 2022. Since 2006, the Foundation has provided \$3.2 million to Special Operations wounded service members and their families.












