Special Operations Warrior Foundation 2025 Annual Report

1. Mission: The Special Operations Warrior Foundation's enduring promise to America's Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marine Corps Special Operations Personnel is to honor the fallen, and all Medal of Honor Recipients, by providing full educations and additional opportunities, "cradle to career" (preschool – college), to their children, ensuring: (1) Comprehensive educational support including, but not limited to, academic advocacy, preschool and private school grants, tutoring, support for students with disabilities, college readiness programs, full financial assistance for up to a four-year post-secondary degree, access to our college to career transitions program, a commitment to cover educational costs for the surviving children of Special Operations Personnel whose spouses perish while the Special Operator is actively serving, while providing a variety of other practical programs and services. (2) Provide immediate financial grants to severely combat-wounded, ill, and injured Special Operations Personnel who require hospitalization.

2. SOWF offered funding for educational programs to 1200 children of: fallen Special Operations personnel, medal of Honor recipients, active-duty Special Operations personnel whose spouse died.

a. SOWF provided \$6.5 million in funding for 283 students attending colleges, universities, or post-secondary education programs (scholarships and related expenses).

b. SOWF provided \$206,247 in funding for counseling (Operation EPIC and College to Career Transition Conference).

c. SOWF provided \$859,969 in funding for tutoring.

d. SOWF provided \$232,036 in funding for preschool.

e. SOWF provided \$62,800 in funding for internships.

f. SOWF provided \$173,940 in funding in support of Special Operations Personnel (severely wounded, ill, or injured SOF personnel).

g. 29 students attended Operation EPIC, SOWF's College preparation program.

h. 19 students attended SOWF's college to career transition conference.

3. SOWF provided \$173,940 in immediate financial assistance to 58 severely wounded, ill, or injured Special Operations personnel.
